

Computer Security/Digital Forensics: Young Scholars Program

High school CS/DF Scholars gain valuable skills related to digital literacy while exploring career opportunities related to Computer Security, Information Assurance, and Digital Forensics. Investigate the design and use of games and simulations for educational purposes, and the research and development issues associated with each. Experience various modeling and simulation software packages (MicroWorlds, Excel, Scratch, and StarLogo).

Participants will engage in hands-on activities and learn about digital literacy (technology fluency and applications, team building, collaboration tools, problem based critical thinking), defending against viruses, Trojan Horses, and worms; and applying basic security concepts through gaming, modeling and simulation development, while investigating exciting careers that interconnect the fields of science, math, technology, and computer security. Students will be given an opportunity to open, examine and install hardware components of a personal computer. Students will also gain basic knowledge of a computer operating system. Students will also discuss such topics as cryptography, system vulnerabilities, and careers in computer security/digital forensics. Tours of local labs will be conducted, and students will have the opportunity to hear from a variety of speakers from state and federal agencies and local security companies.

- Learn more about careers in IA/IA and Digital Forensics


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


